I recently returned from a very emotional and uplifting trip to Israel, where I visited Sergei, the beautiful young boy who just underwent heart surgery. Sergei was diagnosed with Chernobyl Heart syndrome at birth, and with a lack of proper medical care, he progressively got worse. Unfortunately, Sergei's first surgery was unsuccessful, and he was kept in a medically-

induced coma for two days. The doctors had to perform a second surgery, which thank G-d saved his life.

When we first visited Sergei in the hospital, he was barely breathing and on a ven-
